Hello, and welcome to research the News. This week we're talking about why researching the news is important. And as always, we're live so there'll be no edits to the podcast. But this week, we're going to start out with something a little different a monologue. Gretchen will be joining us soon. But for now, I'm just going to talk about why research the news exists. So why does the research the news podcast exist? Now if you look at our mission statement, we exist have healthy dialogue with people of all backgrounds promoting open discussions between people of differing viewpoints, to research the news and search for truth. Now, that's our mission. But there's a reason why podcasts like this have to exist. And to me, it's media consolidation. Now I'm going to go into some facts here in 19 8350, corporations controlled most of the American media that was magazines, books, music, newspapers, movies, radio and television, that is a tiny number for a country of over 300 million people. By 1992, that number was around 25 companies that controlled all the media. And less than 10 years later, in 2000, that number was at six. Now there's been some mergers. And these are the five media companies that control 90% of the media. Number one, Time Warner at&t, number two, Disney number three, Comcast, NBC Universal, number four News Corp, which is Fox News. And number five, Viacom and CBS. And on top of that, that's not including the Washington Post being owned by Jeff Bezos, or all of the Bloomberg channels and publications owned by Michael Bloomberg, the guy who spent over \$500 million of his own money to buy his way into stage at the presidential debates, or even Warren Buffett owning around 70 daily newspapers. Now I like Warren Buffett, but he shouldn't control 70 newspapers. So why does this all matter? There's a term called the fourth estate that's been used throughout history to describe the press. But what is the fourth estate? And why do they call it that? Traditionally, in Europe, there were three groups who held most of the power. And specifically the top two, there was the clergy, the nobility, and the commoners. The commoners being the ones who had, of course, the least amount of power. The press is supposed to be that fourth rung of power that holds the others in check the government. But that's why journalism is important. And the best definition of journalism I found is from the American Press Institute, who says the purpose of journalism is to provide citizens with the information they need to make the best decisions about their lives, their communities, their societies, and their governments. The press is supposed to inform us not feed us propaganda to help their personal agendas. And just to be clear, this isn't an attack on the left or the right media. They're just two sides of the same coin. So I always like to learn from history. But we don't have to go back that far to see whether the source of opinion peddlers at MSNBC, CNN or Fox News. If you're listening to them, you know, it's going to be skewed. And the reason why it's people like Bill O'Reilly, and Rachel Maddow, who are the same person, they do the same things. Now, I know Bill O'Reilly has gone from Fox News and has been for years, but he's had some long term effects. On 2003, Bill O'Reilly led the charge to rally Americans to support the Iraq War. Over and over again, he drilled it in our heads that Saddam had weapons of mass destruction. And of course, we eventually found out that that wasn't

true. And to be fair, he did apologize kind of end he actually did dress down Donald Rumsfeld on his show, but it was way too late. Because today, and 2021 40% of all Americans and 51% of Republicans still believe that Saddam Hussein either probably or definitely had weapons of mass destruction. The damage was done by bad media. And today, you have Rachel Maddow, who is now the number one news person in journalism, just like Bill O'Reilly was. She is diametrically opposed the beliefs of Bill O'Reilly but leads the cable ratings among liberals, just like a Reilly letter on conservatives for weeks and months in the summer of 2020. She drilled it into viewers heads that Russia was paying bounties to Taliban militants if they killed American soldiers. And on top of that, Trump knew about it and did nothing because collusion if you watch her show, she loves that word. 39% of all Americans and 66% of Democrats believe that Trump knew that Russia was paying bounties to kill American soldiers going into the last election, Biden said on the campaign trail repeatedly, and what do we find out this week? White House press secretary Jen Psaki said that after review of the classified reports the intelligence community determined it had only low to moderate confidence in their authenticity, not they were true. Just low confidence they are even authentic. And then she said it was due in part to the ways in which the intelligence was obtained, including from interrogations of Afghan detainees. Now if you read through the lines, when they talk about interrogations, that probably means things like waterboard thing that have proven to be ineffective at gathering factual intelligence. But it doesn't matter what's true anymore. Whether it's true or not, the damage has been done by bad media. So I'll say it again, Rachel Maddow, Bill O'Reilly are the same person. And we're all being shaped by these people whether or not we watched mainstream news. The outcomes of this are people who go against core beliefs we as Americans should all be fighting for. I can't stress this enough. It wasn't long ago that we didn't have freedom of speech. And in fact, people fought for hundreds of years, to get the freedom to say what they wanted without being jailed. That idea of freedom of speech has always been a rallying cry for liberals throughout history, who are held back by tyrannical governments and monarchies look, through the history of France, the history of America, they were revolutionaries, liberal revolutionaries. But now Facebook and Twitter are censoring conservatives and many liberals are celebrating it. To be clear, the First Amendment doesn't cover private companies, but it's still shutting down speech. And many conservatives today continue to do Christ canceled culture, while calling for boycotts of Major League Baseball and Coca Cola. But to be clear, none of these people are classical liberals or classical conservatives. These are those people who are shaped by the media conglomerates, those five groups that control 90% of the media. They're the people who are believing the media hype. So when you watch the news today, it feels like we're all terrible people. This group hates that group. But when you break it down, they're just all made up groups. Media puts people into groups. And then make sure to let everyone know that the other groups are terrible people. If you're black, you have to hate police. If you're white, you should be afraid of people of color. If you're gay, just know that all Christians hate you. And if you're a gun owner, you're okay with school shootings. And if you're a straight white male, you're the worst of the bunch. The truth is, there are bad people in all the groups I just mentioned. But the number of good people in those groups outweigh the bad by an astronomical amount. But if we only focus on the bad, it seems overwhelming. And that's what the media is there to do. So we need to stop idolizing media commentators and political candidates, the promote these fallacies, because all it does is lead to more people who are far left and far right, and unable to have rational conversations about the real issues we face. So to wrap up in 1891, the Irish poet and playwright Oscar Wilde wrote, In old days, men had the rack, which was a torture device. Now they have the press. That is an improvement, certainly. But still, it is very bad, and wrong, and demoralizing. Somebody called journalism, the fourth

estate, that was the true at the time, no doubt, but at the present moment, it is the only estate. It is eaten up the other three, the Lord's temporal say nothing, the Lord spiritual have nothing to say. And the House of Commons has nothing to say and says it, we are dominated by journalism. This was 130 years ago. And it's important to note that Oscar Wilde was sentenced to two years of hard labor for being gay. But he said this years before he was put in jail, his trial was considered one of the first celebrity trials was a big news event. And the press was a big part of why he went to jail simply for being gay. The press, the fourth estate can come for anyone, but right now they are sending us after each other. And we need to stand up and say, This is not alright. Only 41% of Americans say they trust the media. So my question is, why do we keep blindly following their narrative? And Gretchen, how are you?

It's about how you get more people to tune in and how you make money and how you keep people on your side and build up this base of people who are going to support you. And that's the same with we could we could make that same comment about politicians, the same way, I'm sure journalists, but going back to just wrap up, I think the my bias towards journalism and what journalism should be is what I mentioned in my opening monologue there, which, again, the purpose of journalism is to provide citizens with the information they need to make the best decisions about their lives, their communities, their societies and their governments. That's what it should be about. It shouldn't be about people trying to change the shape politics, it shouldn't be about people trying to get certain politicians in office, it should be about here's the information about these people, so you can make a wise decision. And that's what I enjoy people. You know, I think the last last thing I'll say in my bias is that I know you talked about how you didn't listen to much conservative viewpoints. I listen to viewpoints from all over the spectrum. What I found about myself, is when there's a Republican in office, I have a hard time listening to CNN, because nothing that that Republican does is good. And people can talk about Trump. But this has been happening for a very long time. And when a Democrats in office, I have a very hard time listening to Fox News, which is pretty much the only mainstream conservative network because no matter what Biden does, or whatever any liberal politician does, it's going to be bad. But there are journalists on all the networks. And you and I talked about this, and I look at someone like Chris Wallace, who's a journalist and did the one of the debates. He is someone who plays down the middle. And he is a very honest journalist. And he is not afraid to ask hard questions, or Republicans or liberals. And he happens to be in Fox News. And a lot of people that are conservative hate him because it's like, well, you're not you're not helping out our guy. And there's a lot of liberals who are like, I hate Chris Wallace.

because he's on Fox News. So he must be the devil. And that is part of the entire problem. So sure, that's the end of my rant. And now we want to get into some questions. Every single group you just mentioned, though, is still a media conglomerate except for NPR. Yes. And yeah, it's crazy. I mean, even when you look at the local stations, that's the thing when we talk about Yeah, I think I think Katie came may be owned by Viacom, corporate, but even still, like, yeah, one

news station, or one news organization owns a bunch of radio stations. And it just everything you say it's still like, operation. And so it's funny, because when you said, you know, you don't hear a lot of bias, and I'm just telling you the news. I think that's some of the only places I can find that anymore. Something like the AP and rap writers and writers directly have their apps because they typically still follow journalism standards. But yeah, everyone has an agenda. And so sometimes it's it's weird, because I think if you would pull it out of context, and maybe look from 20 years ago, I'm not saying this is the definitely would happen. But if you would have heard those headlines you would think, the same bias, but now everything is so biased. Yeah. But when it's like, oh, it's just steering you one way or the other, it seems more normal. And I think that's the part that makes it tough for me is when I read these article, any article, I hear things and I immediately think, what's the actual story behind it. So when they say, even when I was looking up information about how many people believed that Iraq, Saddam Hussein had weapons of mass destruction, it was so hard to find actual numbers. And if you looked at a conservative site, they would downplay the amount of conservatives who believed the now lie. And if you looked at a liberal site, they would say, you know, Republicans still believe that there's weapons of mass destructions not noting the fact that there were still a ton of liberals that believe that and so even though they're they're putting out these fact based articles, they're still clearly skewed in my mind. And that's kind of the problem I have. And I think you talked about and one thing with even with Alicia, as I call her and said of the Alexa word, so then it doesn't activate them in my house get even with her, I mean, it's all about algorithms. And that's the same with Google. That's the same with any search engine. And so I've watched the documentary, if you haven't seen them yet, it's really good. There's Q anon into the void I think it's called but I watched like a five part HBO series. And there was another one that we had talked about before about the the news algorithms and what Facebook was doing. And if you look at the start of all these, it goes back to if you're in Q anon those people that are into Q anon you watch one video, and then YouTube and Facebook say here's some more videos just like it because they didn't. They didn't care that you were watching some crazy stuff. Yeah, and lead people to do some crazy things. They just wanted more eyes, more views, more money, and so it all brought people in to this place, and they ended up now it's kind of interesting because there's all this pushback and they got rid of all these coupon sites, and they're banning them. And it's, there's people that are standing up, even if they don't like the coupon, they're standing up and saying that still like you're only taking down coupon. And you know, what about blue? And none. I feel like there's this whole the left and right. I don't know if we've talked about this in the show before. But there's the horseshoe theory of politics where the further left you go, and the further right you go, everyone connects back. And I used to be able to look at a conspiracy theory on Facebook and be like, Oh, that's one of my liberal friends, or that's one of my conservative friends. Now, I have no idea who's who because they all are just getting really crazy. And people are looping back around. And it's like, Y'all are complaining about the same things. I was like, because I don't, I don't know what I don't know who to vote for. He's like, How in the world do not know who to vote for. And I was like, I'm not paying attention. I don't have any, I don't have any opinion. And he really got mad at me. Yeah. And it was in that moment when I was like, oh, because I was just living my happy life. I'm poor, I was super poor. I was working like three jobs, trying to you know, afford my studio apartment. Working at Walmart, and teaching dance classes and dancing with this company. And I really didn't see the world any bigger than my bubble that I was living in. And it was after that, then I really started to pay attention. And, and, and started consuming media, but I really still wasn't buying newspapers, or and at that point, I didn't even have a computer. I would just talk to friends and kind of get their gist of what was happening in the world. And that's like,

Yeah, I remember buying newspapers in high school. And that's the thing. It's kind of interesting. So the point of asking about that is that, you know, I, I remember buying newspapers because I actually wanted to read the news. I wanted to see what Yeah, I also was a big fan of the Calvin and Hobbes comic strip. If you haven't watched it ever, just or looked at it, feel free to go watch it. It's one of the best comic strips ever. But I loved reading the news and trying to keep up to date, even in high school. And then, of course, now, newspapers have shifted, and there's almost no local press anymore. And we

talked about this earlier, where if a website asks us to pay money to read the news, yeah, it should be free. So instead, and I think this is most people, it's like, well, where's free news? It's Twitter. It's Facebook, its YouTube. I can go there and listen to all these people and I think we talked about this a couple weeks ago. But the downfall of someone like Steven Crowder, who I think started out with a, he was one of the few conservative people who seemed to be you know, you had some funny things. He was provocative but not didn't cross any lines. And now he, in order to keep views up has gone down this like, far right racist commentary, that's just so sad to watch. And I think there's always these times where you see it, you see it in your own news when you're watching it. And it gets further and further left and further and further, right, if you start reading those kind of articles, but the people and the the sources of the news are doing the same thing. And I think that starts at the top with this, these corporations. And I think I just don't understand how we can look at five companies controlling that much of the media and thinking it's okay. And and I'm not someone who thinks that billionaires should, should not exist, and they're terrible people by nature, I think Warren Buffett is seems like a really great guy who's going all his money he's already promised to give back. So even though he's made all these billions, and I'm sure he's really enjoying his life, he's giving them all back. And he's done a lot of terrible things. And that's great. But he owns 70 newspapers. And so yeah, which one of those newspapers are going to write a bad story about him? And Jeff Bezos controls one of the biggest newspapers in the country, if not the biggest, and they aren't going to write anything bad about Amazon. And so I have a real problem with with this kind of system. And I think there there used to be, are you familiar with the even something like the fair time I forget what it's called now, it's the fair Time Act where basically you had each political age side had the same amount of time on air. Yeah. So that was taken down by Ronald Reagan, which was part of the whole impetus for so many of these conglomerations, and all these corporations to break down. So when, if you look at the history and look at what happened here, when Reagan was in office, it started out with those 50 corporations. And by the time George HW Bush came into office, we were already down to, you know, 25, and then six, and it just was a downward spiral. Because at that point, I was like, oh, okay, now we can just buy up all these other people. There's no limit to how many corporations and how many news senators we can own. We can just buy them all. And let's just be this one monolithic voice. And there needs to be something that's done about that. Because things like this happen. Now, Gretchen, I'm gonna do a pop quiz for you. Are you ready? Yeah, I'm gonna see how, see how accurate you are with with the New York Times came out recently with an article about how people just didn't understand what was happening with COVID. And the amount of people the how many people actually need to be hospitalized. So what are the chances of somebody with COVID being hospitalized, and you can go anywhere from 0% to 100%? Someone gets COVID. What are the odds that they're going to be hospitalized?

The only people who are the people who got it right, the one to 520 6% of Republicans got it right. 20% of independents got it. Right. And 10% of Democrats got it right. And actually, it was more of the probably the most interesting thing to me, it was the people who said 0%, or less than one basically, Democrats had two independent said three and Republicans had 4% say that that was the case. So actually, all of them are much the same. So it was near like as zero to 1%. Now, you and I think it's funny to me, because when you listen, the media on the left, they say that Republicans are all anti science, and they don't believe it exists. And it's this huge thing. It was only two, three and 4%. They're all within 1%, which is a margin of error. So and I don't think many people are believing that it just doesn't exist. Right. But it's crazy to me that overall 40% of Democrats and 28% of Republicans thought that over 50% of people who got COVID must be hospitalized. That's just not

That's what gets people to tune in and say, Yeah, I'm going to get involved in this. And I'm going to I'm going to keep watching you,

because I hate those nasty Republicans and those nasty Democrats to and it's all pitting us against each other. And it's just so unbelievably frustrating to me.

But I will say this is the part two that frustrates me with COVID. You know, I was talking to a friend of mine who is actually tends to be lean liberal, not progressive, liberal, and was pretty frustrated with the way the media has covered things since Biden's got into office because we actually are killing it. Like, overall, we have done an amazing job. I think over half the people who are open for vaccinations have vaccinations. We talked about this before West Virginia was leading the way for a while there's so many good things happening with the vaccine rollout in America. And I think there are I mean, we're not making I don't wanna make this a vaccine thing, because there are people who have serious considerations about we there's all these things where people have to make their own choices. But overall, we're doing better than most, if not all the countries in the world in this vaccine rollout. And through that I found David Pakman. Shout out David Pakman. And I really do enjoy his podcast. And the reason that I enjoy it, I don't actually agree with him 100% of the time, but I enjoy his viewpoints. He's an economist, he was an economist he went school for. And I think he's just really brilliant when it comes to that kind of stuff. But I love the way he does not he doesn't pull punches with whoever is in office. He He's talked a lot about Joe Biden and the problems. And he's he's really frustrated with the news media right now, too. And in high school, we always were told, you know, Wikipedia is not a real source of information you can't we have to look at new sources that if someone is someone comes to me, one of the things I'll do typically when I meet someone, especially if I don't know anything about politics, and they start talking politics right away, I don't care if they're conservative or liberal. Typically someone who's very open about talking politics either doesn't really know what they believe or why they believe it. And that's I think the majority

of people who are very open about politics. I think the wiser people tend to be a little more quiet. I tend to jump into politics and like to think I know what I'm talking about. But I'm I think I'm a very rare exception to the rule. And I think it'd be talked a lot of people they would say I'd have no idea what I'm talking about. But I think what I do often is I played dumb at first and I find out why people believe what they do. So if someone comes to me and they're anti Trump or they're anti Biden or they're anti Hillary or whoever it is, I told me about that. Why do you believe that? And it goes back to what I said earlier, if if they're using talking points, and if that's all they're using, I don't really value that opinion. And I think that there are a lot of people that if they tend to agree, if it's someone, if I'm a Hillary supporter, and someone comes up and says, like, wow, Trump's terrible, like, Hillary is the person I would have voted for. It's like, yes, and we just get into this, like, oh, it's someone like me, and you hate that guy. And so you and me are friends now, and let's share why we love her. And it's, it becomes that it's the, it's our own personal algorithm. It's the Facebook algorithm in person, we're gonna keep being around people who who talk like we do, and get excited about it and share with them. And we're only sharing that same information back and forth. And so I like to hear someone that maybe takes a little while to get it out that they know about politics, but those people are tend to be the ones that are more reserved and in the middle and are able to have conversations. What I think about myself that I that I like is the fact that I've had some very what other people would say are very difficult conversations or conversations very difficult people. And I've been able to have them because I enjoy actually listening to what other people are saying. And I feel like if you listen to what other people are saying, and have done your research, people aren't as confrontational. But if they're just two people talking and talking points, and you're Republicans are racist, and Democrats are socialists, and you hate America, if that's what you're saying to each other, you're never going to come to any kind of common ground.

And I feel like that's what we need to do as citizens because I think it really is I can't express enough how frustrated I am with us as people not being willing to stand up and say this is not okay. And I don't want to attack all of my fellow Americans and that's how I think political or My fellow Americans, but it's really disgusting me to see us attack each other and I love having conversations with my friends who are black I had a conversation with a friend of mine who was transgender after our, our conversation last week because I wanted to see I said, if you listen, I want to know, did I say something offensive? Is there something there that I change? I want to know what people think even if I, even if I, I can't understand what it's like to be transgender, I can't understand what it's like to be black. But I want to be able to find out why. Why what it's like, and by by talking to people and talking to people who have have lived this. And when I talk to people who've lived it, my friends who are black, they I don't know any of them who hate cops and want them to die. And are. That's not the majority of people. When I talk to my friends who are cops? I don't know any of my friends who are cops that are racist people. Now. I will say, we talked about this earlier, I do think there's something to be said about certain cops not having their job. I mean, clearly what happened? Yeah. The guy this week, or a couple of I guess it was a couple months ago, but the lieutenant who was pulled over and pepper sprayed, if you look at that situation, and this is this is kind of what I'll wrap up on because I think this is one specific instance, when we look at what happened in that instance, from the media's perspective, you watch Fox News, and it was all about well, he didn't get out of his car. The media went to a white man pulling a gun and a black man, turning into this race thing, Fox News was downplaying the fact this black man should have just got out of the car and listened. And it was actually thinking about it. Yeah, instead of talking about the hours Hispanic man who pulled the pulled the gun out and was yelling, and if you look at the video and actually watch it, the white cops seem to be way more reasonable. And if it was just him, and I talked to friends of mine who were black, and they said same thing. And so if it was him, it probably would have been calmed down, it wouldn't been a big deal. But that older cop was the one causing the problems, and he should be fired. And I think, is it because he was racist? I don't know. He seemed like he was racist. But at the very minimum, even if he wasn't a racist guy, you should not act like that and pull a gun out. You don't need to do that. And so he should be gone. And I think the conversation will come to training and why are there only like two weeks of training? When cops start using guns, we can talk about why cops can be I mean, maybe it's an age thing. That guy has been a cop for probably 2030 years versus the young guy who was handling it better. So what what age do we say, hey, take a year sabbatical like we do with teachers. Time off and make sure we're getting mental like mental

Would he be comfortable doing this to me if I wasn't a white man? So these are all things that we were like, trying to figure out, like, after the fact. And it really shook us both, because we were like, not understanding what in the world this guy was even thinking, but it goes to like training. Like you were just saying, you know, why did he feel that that was an appropriate thing for him to do in that moment? Why or why do the you know, what kind of training are they going through? To make for a traffic stop? What is something and and the repercussions of doing something like this? So yeah, when you were saying about it, I just had that memory kind of flashed back at me. And it really does go to training for me, for cops. And and I think I think even this is like, yeah,
